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

KCAA Spring 2013 Business Meeting and Luncheon *Preservation of Digital Objects*, Elizabeth Dubuisson, Archives Librarian, Combined Arms Research Library

Preservation of digital objects is a challenge almost all archives are facing. The subject is so overwhelming that a lot of organizations don't even know where to start or what steps to take. In August Dubuisson attended a train the trainer

workshop organized by the Library of Congress' Digital Preservation Outreach and Education team. The instructors presented the Baseline Digital Preservation Curriculum which consists of six topics: identify, select, store, protect, manage, and provide. At the KCAA spring luncheon Dubuisson will provide a very brief overview of the six topics and information that will assist in creating or maintaining a digital preservation game plan.

KCAA Seeking New Officers and Committee Chairs

Nazarene Archives

Today only 30 percent of the Church of the Nazarene's members live in the United States or Canada. Nearly 28 percent live in Latin America and the Caribbean, and 26 percent are Africans. The remainder are scattered across Europe, Asia, and the Pacific islands. Several of the Nazarene Archives' accessions in 2012 underscore its host institution's international nature. The Leoda Grebe Collection (4 c.f.) consists of papers, photographs, and artifacts that reflect life in India in the early 20th century. A missionary teacher, Grebe taught in a school for girls (mostly orphans) in Calcutta, later transferring to Kishorganj in East India (now Bangladesh). A significant accretion to the Robert Perry Collection (1 c.f.) consists of hundreds of photographic images-prints, negatives, slides, and glass slides. An educator and pastor with a Ph.D. in history, Perry lived and taught for many years in Swaziland and the Republic of South Africa. One of his passions has been documenting the lives and culture of African Nazarenes, and the photographs he has donated join a significant body of papers that he donated to the Archives several years earlier. A notable accretion (.25 c.f.) to the Brenda Gould Collection consists of slides and color prints that span her career as a missionary teacher, which began in Haiti in 1971 and continued in Martinique (W.I.), and Cote d'Ivoire.

These join similar collections acquired in 2011, like the *Prescott and Bessie Beals Photograph Collection* (hundreds of scanned images from early-to-mid-20th century India), the *Elva Bates Collection* (correspondence from Africa), *Kathyren Dixon Collection* (correspondence from Africa), *Frank and Ann Sutherland Collection* (correspondence from medical missionaries in China), the *Leprosy Mission Files* (administrative papers, Swaziland), and significant accretions to the *Raleigh Fitkin Memorial Hospital Collection* (thousands of pages of scanned hospital administration records from Swaziland).

MINORITY INTERNSHIP PROGRAM PROCEDURAL GUIDELINES

Responsibilities of the Archival Institution

- 1. Develop a comprehensive plan for the internship to insure that the program provides theoretical and practical experience in the basic archival functions of appraisal and acquisition, arrangement and description, reference and access, public programming, and preservation.
- 2. Provide a listing of required reading material and make assignments based on this material.
- 3. Coordinate efforts with the Minority Internship Committee to evaluate the progress of the intern.
- 4. Participate in some form of oral examination to illustrate knowledge gained by the intern.
- 5. Prepare a written evaluation of the internship for the Minority Internship Committee.

Responsibilities Of The Intern

- 1. Meet prior to the internship for an introductory conference. At this time specific institutional requirements could be explained, introductory readings assigned, and a course of instruction outlined.
- 2. Faithfully adhere to scheduled attendance requirements.
- 3. Comply with all institutional regulations.
- 4. Complete all assigned readings and exhibit through actions and oral discussion a firm grasp of archival concepts taught during the internship.
- 5. Complete a specified project, if assigned.
- 6. Prepare a final paper to evaluate the program and interpret what they have gained from the experience. Give an oral presentation at a quarterly meeting if feasible.

The Center for the History of Family Medicine (CHFM) is proud to announce that it has acquired a significant new donation in the form of 500 titles from Dr. Adam G. N. Moore's personal library which will constitute the new Adam G.N. Moore, MD Collection in the history of Family Medicine at CHFM.

Son of psychiatrist and poet Merrill Moore, MD, and Ann Leslie Nichol Moore, a specialist in pre-school education, Dr. Moore is a graduate of Harvard College, and of Aberdeen University Faculty of Medicine in Scotland, where he received the M.B. and Ch.B. degrees in 1964. After serving as a resident at the Aberdeen Royal Infirmary and in its "Casualty" (Emergency) De-

casualty (Emergency) bepartment, Dr. Moore returned to the United States and completed additional residencies in pediatrics and medicine at Carney Hospital in the Dorchester

section of Boston, Massachusetts.

A self-described "old family doc", Dr. Moore practiced for three decades as a family physician in his hometown of Squantum, Massachusetts. After closing his private solo practice in 1997, Dr. & Mrs. Moore retired to New Hampshire.

In addition to his professional ca-

reer, Dr. Moore served the venerable (and enormous) Boston Medical Library for more than thirty years as Secretary and/or as a member of its Board of Trustees. Over the course of the last six decades, he has also brought together a large personal library and collection of artifacts relating to interests in areas such as medicine, natural history, cartography and dictionaries.

Dole Institute to Celebrate 10 Years

The Robert J. Dole Institute of Politics Archive and Special Collections at the University of Kansas will celebrate its 10th Anniversary on July 22, 2013. To commemorate the occasion the Dole Archive will launch a collecting initiative to acquire ancillary collections from Senator Dole's staffers. Other anniversary projects include the installation of an in-house exhibit highlighting Senator Dole's accomplishments over the last ten years, and processing the Dole Institute's extensive events and programs photograph collection.

CLAIM YOUR HERITAGE



The newly created Moore Collection in the history of Family Medicine at CHFM consists of titles which Dr. Moore describes as "the book you'd have if you didn't have a doctor". The collection relates to the history of Family Medicine, from prerevolutionary America up to

the present day. According to Dr. Moore, "These materials have been collected with the intention of showing, in an historical context, how people's health has been

maintained, and also how their medical problems have been recognized, interpreted and treated . . . For literally many decades, topical loan exhibits have been prepared and lent anonymously from these holdings for use by schools, hospitals, libraries, museums and other venues in association with their special events or for general interest. Since use of the internet has become widespread, the potential usefulness of this eclectic type of collection has broadened considerably."

Dr. and Mrs. Moore's gift is the most significant collection of books on the history of Family Medicine to be donated to the Center in its more than two decades of operation. "As it is perhaps the most comprehensive private library relating to the history of family medicine, we are very excited to receive the Moore gift and include it in our permanent collections," said CHFM Manager Don Ivey. "This material is ideal for use as a research, reference and teaching resource to demonstrate both how the specialty has evolved over time and how important family medicine has been, and continues to be, in the development of medicine in America as a whole."

Dole Institute 2013 Research Fellowship

Dole Institute of Politics is now accepting applications for the 2013 Research Fellowship. This \$2,500 award is awarded to graduate students and post-doctoral scholars whose research supports substantial contributions to the study of Congress, politics, or policy issues on a national or international scale. The fellow will be required to conduct research at the Dole Archive for a period of 1-3 weeks between July 1, 2013, and June 30, 2014. KSHS Completes 2 Year Project on Menninger Collection

The Kansas Historical Society recently finished a two year, National Historical Publications and Records Commission funded project to describe at the folder level approximately 2462 cubic feet of records of the Menninger Foundation. Evolving in Topeka, Kansas, in 1925 from Charles Frederick Menninger's medical practice begun six years earlier, Menninger operated an internationally known psychiatric hospital with postgraduate training programs for psychiatrists, psychologists, and people in allied fields.

The Menninger Foundation Archives includes papers of a number of members of the Menninger family, circa 1880 - 1992; corporate records of the Foundation, circa 1847 - 2002; and the Historic Psychiatry Collection, 1644 - 1991. The family papers include those of Dr. Karl Menninger, already the most heavily used and one of the largest portions of the collection. Dr. Karl was one of the founders and the author of numerous popular books on mental illness. The corpo-

rate records include materials from Menninger's clinics, hospital, school, and research departments, as well as affiliated individuals and organizations. The Historic Psychiatry Collection is a product of Menninger's interest in the history of its profession and was collected by the Foundation's own archival program. It contains manuscripts of individuals who were influential in the development of medicine, psychology, and psychiatry, including Dorothea

Dix, Anna and Sigmund Freud, Florence Nightingale, and Benjamin Rush. Records in the Menninger Foundation Archives are more complete for the years after World War II, but the collection documents the entire period of the Foundation's existence in Topeka prior to its move to Houston in 2003.

Menninger Clinic patient records series were transferred to Houston and are *not* at the Kansas Historical Society. Descriptions of the records in the Menninger Foundation Archives are available in the Kansas Historical Society's Archives Catalog at http://kshs.org/ archives. We can all agree that emergency preparedness is an important topic. However, frustration and difficulty can arise when considering how to get started, move forward or stay on track. See some MayDay suggestions below.

MAYDAY suggestions!

Get Started

- Become familiar with <u>http://kansaschern.wordpress.com</u> which has resources for before and after a disaster.
- If you do not have a disaster plan, make a timeline for developing one.
- Update your staff contact information and create a wallet-size version of your emergency contact roster. See the Kansas Pocket Response Plan template <u>http://</u>kansaschern.files.wordpress.com/2010/02/prep-ks1.doc.
- Conduct a building evacuation drill and evaluate the results.

Move Forward

- If you have a disaster plan, dust it off and bring it up to date.
- Eliminate hazards such as boxes and furniture in hallways, blocked fire exits, or improper storage of paints and solvents.
- Identify the three biggest risks to your collection or building (such as a leaking water pipe, heavy snow, or power failure) and outline steps to mitigate them.

Stay on Track

- Join forces with nearby institutions and develop a protocol for helping each other in case of a disaster. Add your network to KCHERN's regional page. <u>http://kansaschern.wordpress.com/regions</u>.
- Get to know your local firefighters and police. Invite them to tour your institution and give you pointers on safety and preparedness.

News from the National Archives - Kansas City Branch

Between Rivers: Steamboating in Missouri and Iowa has been extended through October 26, 2013 in the Regional Gallery

Between the Rivers explores the steamboat industry and its impact on the river environment, culture, and economy in Missouri and Iowa from the 1850s to the early 1900s. Located between the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers, the land and people of Missouri and Iowa have long been defined by these two great rivers. Together the rivers and their tributaries opened pathways to ex-



ploration, trade, settlement, industry, war, and freedom in the Midwest. But it wasn't just the river itself that was critical to western development-the invention of the steamboat brought about a revolution in American river commerce as significant as the railroad on land. Long before railroad tracks crisscrossed through the country, the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers served as major thoroughfares of transportation for people and cargo.

Citizen Archivist Event Held at the National Archives at Kansas City

The National Archives at Kansas City was joined by eight members of our local community to participate in our first Citizen Archivist event held on December 18, 2012. This half day event included an exhibit tour and time in the research room to work on projects. The focus of the projects was scanning/ digitization and data entry from a variety of record groups: Bureau of Indian Affairs, U.S. Attorneys, U.S. District Court, and Bureau of Navigation. Collectively, the participants digitized 1141 images and created 557 index entries. 
Fred Harvey: The Man, the Brand, and the American West will open on May 7, 2013 in the Concourse Gallery
