Meet the Spencers: A Marriage of Arts & Sciences Marcella Huggard, Archives and Manuscripts Coordinator – Kenneth Spencer Research Library



library was originally dedicated on November 8, 1968.

"Meet the Spencers: A Marriage of Arts & Sciences" is currently on display through June 28, 2019, at the <u>Kenneth Spencer</u> <u>Research Library</u>, located on the University of Kansas campus in Lawrence. The exhibit explores the personal, professional, and philanthropic lives of Kenneth and Helen Spencer, a Kansas City-based couple of the mid-twentieth century. It is part of Spencer's ongoing fiftieth anniversary celebrations; the

Kenneth Spencer (1902-1960) was a businessman and industrialist. He started his career working as a mining engineer at Pittsburg & Midway (P&M) Coal Company in Pittsburg, Kansas, under the direction of his father Charles Favor Spencer. During World War II, Kenneth was among the leading advocates who lobbied the federal government for the development of defense industries in the Midwest. In July 1941, the War Department commissioned P&M to design, construct, and operate Jayhawk Ordnance Works in southeastern Kansas. The plant produced synthetic ammonia and other munitions chemicals.

After the war, Kenneth converted Jayhawk to a civilian, commercial enterprise manufacturing fertilizer, plastics, and other industrial products. Under Kenneth's leadership, Spencer Chemical Company quickly expanded and became one of the largest businesses based in Kansas City in the 1940s and 1950s, while he was simultaneously running P&M.

After Kenneth died unexpectedly in 1960, his wife Helen Foresman Spencer (1902-1982) took control of the charitable foundation the couple had started in 1949. Through her leadership, the Kenneth A. and Helen F. Spencer Foundation provided funds for major projects in the greater Kansas City area, specifically in the areas of health and sciences, youth-based organizations, and arts and culture. These projects included, but were not limited to, the construction of KU's Kenneth Spencer Research Library and Helen F. Spencer Museum of Art; purchases of major works of art and construction of a new library space at the Nelson Gallery of Art (now the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art); construction of an educational center at St. Luke's Hospital; and construction of a chemistry building and performing arts theatre at the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

Additionally, the Foundation – and Helen privately – provided funds for general operating expenses and

other projects at institutions that included the Midwest Research Institute (now MRIGlobal), Linda Hall Library, St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Junior Achievement of Greater Kansas City, and many other organizations in the region. The Spencer Foundation was dissolved in 1979.

"Meet the Spencers: A Marriage of Arts & Sciences" is free and open to the public. Kenneth Spencer Research Library is open Monday through Friday, 9:00am – 5:00pm, throughout the year. During the fall and spring semesters when University of Kansas classes are in session, the library is also open on Saturday, 9:00am to 1:00pm.
